Washington, Jan. 17.—The senate yesterday ratified the Samoan treaty without division. The ratification oc-curred in executive session and after two more hours of debate, which was participated in by a number of sena-tors. Mesers, Davis, Foraker and Spooner advocated, and Senators Ba-con, Money and Tillman opposed ratifi-cation. SWastor Eacon made the lead-ing speech in opposition. He based his objection upon the general ground that it was contrary to the spirit of our institutions to attempt to govern any people in opposition to their wishes.
