CHARGE MORE TO CARRY CURRENCY


CHARGE MORE TO CARRY CURRENCY Express Companies Have Par Into Ef-cers a Badipal Chang. New York, Nov. 1—The express com-panies of the country today put into-enter the radical advance in the car-rying charges of currency between New York, Boston, Philadelphia and Chi-caso, which was agreed upon a fort-night since. In the case of shipments botween Chicago and the three great money centers of the Athantic coast the increase is 31-4 per cent, while from Chicago to local points in Indiana, Min-nesota, Wisconsin, Michigan, Jowa and other points in the west, the advance avorages about 10 per cent. It is prob-able that, as a result of this action, con-gressional legislation will be asked for this winter, putting the money carry-ing business entirely under the pro-tection of the national government.


