STORMS AND FLOODS OF GREAT EXTENT AND DESTRUCTIVENESS.

Earthquakes and Fires, Railroad Accidents and Boiler Explosions—The Dead from Casualties in 1888 Number Millions.

JANUARY. Thirteen killed at Haverhill bridge over the Merrimack, on the Boston and Maine railroad.

FEBRUARY. Fire in Buffalo, Loss, \$1,500,000. British bark Abasco wrecked near mouth of the Columbia river, W. T.; 22 drowned.

MARCH. The famous hospice in St. Bernard buried by an avalanche. No lives lost.

APRIL. Eighteen persons killed and forty-one injured in a railway accident near Tampico, Mexico.

FEBRUARY. White Caps fledged and left a man in dying condition in Indiana.

APRIL. First Whitechapel murder reported. Trial of Dave Walker, Bald Knobber chief, in progress in Ozark, Miss.

MAY. Assistant Cashier De Haun, of the Park National bank, New York, defaulter in \$25,000.

JUNE. Mrs. Rawson, whose divorce suit against her husband was the talk of Chicago, shot Maj. Whitney, her husband's attorney, in open court.

JULY. John R. Van Loan, of the Second National bank of Jersey City, a defaulter \$15,000.

AUGUST. Charles A. Picher, teller of Union bank of Providence, R. I., is a fugitive and defaulter in large amounts.

SEPTEMBER. Attorney General Michener, of Indiana, reported a terrible state of affairs as to the depredations of White Caps in the southern part of the state.

OCTOBER. Antonio Flacciano murdered in New York. This was the noted Mafia murder.

NOVEMBER. Division Chief Hansen of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and three others arrested, charged with being implicated in a plot to wreck property of the C., D. and Q.

DECEMBER. Phil Daily, the Long Branch gambler, was shot in a New York den, where he had been seen by a woman's view to robbery. The wound was not a serious one.

JANUARY. A mob attacked the jail at Birmingham, Ala., in an attempt to lynch William Hayes, the murderer. The sheriff and his party fired on them, killing nine and wounding thirty.

FEBRUARY. White Cap outrages in Texas. E. L. Harper, who stole the funds of the Fidelity bank of Cincinnati, a raving maniac.

MARCH. White Cap outrages reported from Ohio. Reported appearance of White Caps at Jamestown, N. Y.

APRIL. White Caps indicted in Indiana. Beginning of trouble between whites and blacks in Mississippi.

JANUARY. Edward S. Bragg confirmed as United States minister to Mexico.

FEBRUARY. Henry George withdrew from the Anti-Poverty society.

MARCH. Gen. Hadesu brought his suit against the Grant family. Business paralyzed; many people frozen to death; numerous railroad accidents and sea disasters.

APRIL. Dis Debar excitement at its height in New York.
