SHOT BY A JEALOUS MAN.

Prominent Chicago Merchant Probably Fatally Wounded in the Auditorium Cafe.

Chicago, March 22 .- John T. Shayne, a wealthy furrier and prominent democratic politician, was shot and probably fatally wounded Tuesday afternoon by Harry H. Hammond, a tailor. The shooting occurred in the cafe of the Auditorium annex, where Shayne was sitting at lunch with Mrs. Hammond, divorced wife of Hammond, and two other ladies. The party had been seated at the table for some time before Hammond appeared. He walked into the cafe and stood for a few minutes and walked out. In ten minutes he returned, and, standing inside the door, deliberately pulled off his gloves, and then walking quickly up to Shayne, who was sitting with his back toward him, drew a revolver. Shayne attempted to rise, but stumbled over the legs of his chair and fell to the floor. As fell under the table and Hammond, pulling up the tablecloth, deliberately fired two more bullets into the helpless man. He then walked out into the office of the hotel, where an officer placed him under arrest. At the station he declined to make any statement. Shayne, who is a widower, has been in company with Mrs. Hammond a great deal since her divorce from approaching marriage between them. GERALD LAPINER FOUND.

ong-Lost Boy Is Discovered in a Ohio Town in the Possession of a Man and a Woman.

Painesville, O., March 22 .- A startling sequel to the abduction of Gerald Lapiner, the three-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Lapiner, which occurred in Chicago May 30, 1898, developed here Tuesday in the recovery and restoration of the child to his mother and the arrest of Mrs. Ann Ingersoll and John Collins, who live about a mile west of Painesville, at whose place the child was found, and where he had been kept since last June. On the 30th of May Gerald Lapiner was abducted by a mysterious woman

from in front of his parents' home, No. 4435 Prairie avenue, in Chicago. The woman and child were traced for a short time and then all track of them was lost. A large reward was offered for the recovery of the child, and although the Chicago police made every effort to bring the kidnapers to justice nothing further could be learned. About two months ago a newspaper account of the abduction and the reward offered came under the notice of Mr. F. E. Ferris and his sister, Miss O. C. Ferris, neighbors of the Ingersolls. Mr. and Miss Ferris suspected that the little boy who had been at the residence of Mrs. Ingersoll since last June might be the missing child, and they entered into correspondence with the Chicago police. After about two months' investigation and correspondence it was determined that the child was the missing Gerald Lapiner. Mrs. Lapiner was notified and she arrived here Tuesday morning to identify the little one. She was met at the station by Deputy Sheriff A. T. May, who has been in charge of the case here, and was taken in a closed carriage to the replaced. 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
