On the Naked Plea of Overproduction Disaster Has Been Forced Upon the People.

The alarmist has a poor vocation Men, generally speaking, who are engaged in active industries, are much given to discounting the prosperity which seems apparent to almost every one who is not profoundly thought ful on the conditions necessary to and the interruptions which are a constant source to the necessary conditions. Therefore it is that the honest masters of trade are constantly on the lookout for an interruption of the essential conditions which insure prosperity. Were these dependent on supply and demand it would not be difficult to gauge the relations between the producer and the consumer, and if honest principles were in control between the two forces, production and consumption, the crisis would in most instances be averted, or certainly controlled within the smallest space of the business affected.

A large, intelligent lesson has been taught in the last few weeks to those controlling the productive market. It it a notable fact that prices of stock in all the actives had sailed into the skies, and insatiate greed was doing its full part to keep them to their flight. The conservative buyers fully appreciated the situation. They felt that the speculators had taken a fearful hold on the manufacturing industries, and the result could not be anything but disastrous. On the naked plea of overproduction this disaster was forced on the people. It could not have been so done had not its principal officers countenanced the movement, and thus gave the strength of their names to the reduction of values. It seems strange that no legislation can be enacted which will insure punishment to those commercial outlaws. That it is not reflects severely on the class of people whom the public selects for the discharge of legislative life. The lesson taught in the above described illustration is one which it is wisdom to heed. The labor, the wage-earners, are less given to the destruction of established industries than are the men who are in possession of the securities, and who speculate to illegitimate returns on the capital they have invested, even though it be of a liquid character.--Cincinnati Enquirer.

### BIG FORCE IS IDLE.

W. R. & F. J. MEAD, PUBLISHERS Is Making No Advance for Relief of Peking.

ATTITUDE CAUSES ASTONISHMENT.

News of Frightful Tragedy at the Chinese Capital Is Feared-Germany to Demand Satisfaction for Murder of Her Minister.

London, July 3 .- The allies are not advancing to the relief of Peking. This announcement to the house of commons by William St. John Brodrick under secretary of state of foreign affairs, was received with exclamations of astonishment and dismay. Sir Elles Ashmed Bartlett inquired if any information had been received from the legations at Peking or as to the composition and command of the relieving force and its present position. Mr Brodrick read the dispatches received, been rapidly arriving, adding:

"We do not know what arrangements have been made locally regarding the command of an expedition, but it has not yet been thought possible to attempt a further advance. The consuls have been in communication with the viceroys in the Yangtse region, and they are quite well aware that support will be given them by her majesty's government in preserving order. It is obviously impossible that the representatives of the now sible that the representatives of the powers at Peking should be consulted, as no communications are passing with them.'

Haste Is Urged.

"The situation is desperate. Hasten." These words from the message of Von Bergen, a member of the German legaion at Peking, countersigned by Sir Robert Hart, inspector general of cusoms, and dated nine days ago, are the theme of all private comment. 

RESERVOIR GIVES WAY.

One Hundred Million Gallons of Water Sweeps Through Grand

Grand Rapids, Mich., July 3 .- The big reservoir of the city waterworks system, located in an elevated situation in the hilly district in the northern part of the city, burst at five a. More than 100,000,000 gallons of mon and had a dozen wives?" water were let loose and rushed down through the valley adjacent, flooding sons. Many dwellings were washed away, others were badly damaged, and all those within a district three blocks square were either wholly or partly filled with sand. Broken buildings, furniture and utensils and ruined effects of all kinds added to the hopeless aspect of the scene. None of the buildings damaged was of costly character, as they were for the most part homes of workingmen. The tracks of the Detroit, Grand Haven & Milwaukee railroad, a short distance north of the reservoir, were under mined and trains on that road were obliged to make a detour via other

The break was first seen by Burt Botsford, a boy, delivering . morning newspapers. It was then only a tiny stream, but, realizing the importance of his discovery, the lad aroused hundreds from sleep and urged them to escape.

The reservoir gave away at the gate house near Livingston street, pouring down hill a stream 30 feet wide and ten feet deep. A number of houses were swept from their foundations and carried away on the flood and crushed. Some streets were torn up to a depth of 40 feet.

Mrs. Cooper, of Clancy street, was literally swept out of her house by the flood. She was carried to the bot tom of the hill and buried to her neck in sand. She was rescued alive, but will probably die. No other fatalities or serious injuries were reported. According to rough estimates the damage will amount to \$200,000.
